

AST Veterans Attend Memorial Dedication in DC

Absentee Shawnee Veterans participated in the Native Veterans Procession and Dedication Ceremony in Washington DC. The event was held November 11 on Veterans Day. They were part of over 1,500 Native Veterans taking part in the dedication of the National Native American Veterans Memorial.

The Veterans walked along the National Mall from the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian to the stage in front of the U.S. Capital. The Memorial was designed by Cheyenne and Arapaho Veteran Harvey Pratt. The design is a raised stainlesssteel circle balanced on a carved stone drum on the campus of the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian.

Pratt said the design came to him in a dream. "We created a path of life, a warrior's circle of honor, lances with sacred colors and prayer clothes, water, the air, the earth, and fire," said Pratt. "I want to thank the Creator, for creation warriors-without them, we may not be here."

The Memorial is the first national landmark honoring Native American Veterans' service. Native Americans have the highest rate of military service than any other demographic in the country. They have fought in every major battle since the Revolutionary War.

Jason Bender. "It was monumental since Native Americans have never been recognized and we weren't even considered citizens until 1924."

The dedication ceremony was delayed for two years due to COVID and it was only fitting that it was held on Veterans Day. AST Veteran Twila Parker, who spearheaded the trip said, "Finally, I felt as a Native American woman Veteran we were finally recognized and respected."

- D. Physically reside within the following Counties: Cleveland, Pottawatomie, Oklahoma, McClain, Garvin, Pontotoc, Seminole, Lincoln, or Okfuskee.
- In cases where a prospective candidate has been convicted of a felony, such person shall not be E. eligible for consideration as a candidate until at least five (5) years have passed following completion of the penalty for such conviction(s).
- Not more than one (1) member of an immediate family shall be elected to the same tribal elective E. body except when running as a candidate for the same elective position.

Maintenance:

The Maintenance staff has completed 38 work orders in the last month while preparing for the upcoming winter months on the Shawnee campus. I would like to thank the Maintenance staff and the Housekeepers for all the work they do for the department.

<u>OEH:</u>

In total for 2022 OEH has assisted Tribal members with 82 different septic renovations and installations, water well drilling and installations, well renovations, and community water connections. For 2022, we have collected, processed, and recycled 38 bales of shredded office paper and cardboard equaling roughly 28.5 tons of recyclable waste that has been diverted from landfills. Cleveland County has begun work on dining hall parking lot at Camp Nikoti and the preliminary work on the entry gate has begun. The parking lot is scheduled to be completed by the end of the year, and the entry gate is on pace to be completed in January, which will complete Phase II of the Youth Camp.

BIA Self-Governance

We seem to be headed in the right direction with our 477 Plan. So far we have received positive feedback from CCDF and JPT. We are waiting to hear from BIE and DOL. Hopefully by the time you get the newsletter our 477 Plan will be finalized by DOI. We look forward to starting it up in 2023.

I am currently looking into 105(l) leases. These leases can be done through IHS and BIA. I will have a meeting with them soon to see if this will be beneficial to the tribe.

On November 7th I listened in on the zoom TSGAC Meeting and November 10th was the DOI SGAC Meeting.

BIA Roads Program

On November 1st, I attended the Oklahoma Tribal Transportation Council and ODOT Meeting in Oklahoma City at the Department of Transportation Building. All Tribes are getting prepared to have their reports submitted by December 31st. It was mentioned that all tribes are unable to submit for new routes on the inventory at this time due to RIFDs system being down. Everyone is still waiting to hear from the Albuquerque Office as to Cleveland County in regards to Hwy 9 and South 72nd Street in Norman. This seems to be a street that has had several fatalities at intersections. The safety funds that we receive in 2023 will help with safety protocols such as signs and lights that are needed to make drivers more aware of intersections.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Hello friends and tribal members,

Here are the few things I want to share and talk about from this past month. Before I do, it is my hope everyone had a nice Thanksgiving and was able to enjoy time spent with your family. For those hunters, I hope you got that monster buck you've been chasing. I don't know about y'all but I can't believe Christmas is almost here. Keep an eye out for notices on potential closures due to weather. As this is the time of year for snow, sleet, ice, and freezing rain, make certain to keep bottled water, blankets, and ice scrapers in your vehicle. Also, don't forget to check your tire pressure.

I am happy to report our Audit is officially complete and was submitted to the Clearinghouse. As expected, we received

the highest rating we can attain of an "unmodified opinion" and there were no major findings. I want to say "Thank You!" to our staff for the work they do and for their cooperation with the Auditing firm in the collection of their data. The company apologized for the scheduling error which almost created a conflict with us for our submission. However, because we were able to submit before the end of the month, we were able to avoid any possible sanctions. For this reason, in recent discussion with their staff, we have already suggested a different time schedule for when they will be at the Complex next year, and to start the process sooner, rather than later.

Another issue that has finally been resolved is the approval of our Indirect Cost (IDC) Rate. As projected, the rate did increase. Finance is working to complete adjustments to individual budgets and update them accordingly. For those who are unfamiliar, this rate and percentage is determined by reviewing data from the previous three years. That being said, I am nervous on how future rates will be affected by the influx of CARES and ARPA funds. These are atypical funds which are not a part of our normal funding base and will likely throw our numbers off and create a lower future rate.

Recently, I've had the opportunity to represent our Tribe at a couple out of state events. The first trip I attended was in Sacramento, California for the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) Annual Conference. I was able to participate in Caucus meetings with Southern Plains Tribal representatives, subcommittee board meetings, and network with other leadership. While there, I was able to confirm follow-up discussion for a future in-person engagement.

The next business trip involved meeting with officials in Washington, D.C. while escorting our AST Veteran's Association. Our Veteran's group was able to participate in the parade for the official unveiling of the Native American Veteran's National Memorial at the National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI). I was able to take a few pictures and share with folks back home. No words can express the full extent of our gratitude to these Warriors.

As I conclude this month's submission, I want to say "Merry Christmas" and "Happy New Year" to all our members, near and far. I hope the Creator answers your prayers and provides you with abundant happiness and joy. I appreciate the continued support and words of advice.





Cultural Preservation Department

Day to day operations have continued to be carried out by each program coordinator to ensure the department as a whole continues to function properly. Following is a breakdown of each departmental program's most recent activities.

Gift Shop

The Gift Shop is open! We have two locations for your shopping convenience. Our Shawnee Gift Shop is located at the complex in the Cultural Preservation building (building 6), and our Little Axe Gift Shop is located in the lobby of the Little Axe Health Center. We are open in Shawnee Monday - Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and once a month, usually at the end of the month, in Little Axe from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. However, from now until the end of December, we will be opening the gift shop in Little Axe twice a month as Christmas is approaching.

We are still working with distributors in producing new emblem barring items such as throw blankets, portfolios, mouse pads, and patches. Currently, we are looking into carrying products from the company Eighth Generation. This company is Native-owned and a Seattle-based art and lifestyle brand. They carry a range of products from blankets to soaps.

We are happy to announce that we have opened the library to the public! Last month, activity in the library included 10 check outs and the addition of two new users. <u>THPO</u>

The THPO Program continues to make great strides and advancements. The THPO staff has steadily been receiving Section 106 projects from various Federal Agencies. Over the past month, the THPO Officer, Mrs. Devon Frazier-Smith, has received 188 new Section 106 projects for review. In conjunction with receiving projects, the program has consulted on 25 projects. These projects were completed in 6 of our 25 areas of interest/states. The THPO and Cultural Preservation Director has also taken part in 2 teleconference calls as it concerns Section 106 projects as well as NAGPRA cases.

From October 31st through November 5th, the Cultural Preservation Director along with Representative Wilson traveled to Columbus, Ohio for the 7th Annual Ohio Tribal Nations Conference. During this week long conference, the eleven Tribes/ Nations in attendance got to sit-down and hear from the Ohio History Connection, the Ohio Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration Ohio Division, and the Nature Conservancy (Ohio) on topics such as on-going projects, work plans, inventories, and there were even planned site visits. This was very important for us to travel to this conference since Ohio is the Shawnee's homelands. Plus, it allows us to continue to build a relationship and keep communication open with the state of Ohio so that there is that continued building of trust, respect, and accountability.

Language

Mr. Scott Miller has been busy working on building the foundations for a language program. He has been given access to the language page on the Tribe's website and has started putting words and phrases with sound bites directly on the page. Some of the categories you can find are seasons, directions, animals, weather, months, fruits and vegetables, and food. This is a trial and error process to eventually turning into a page where tribal members have access to pre-recorded classes, podcasts, learning activities, etc.

Mr. Miller has also connected to Mr. Joel Barnes, Director of the Shawnee Tribe Language Program. He has shared their foundation pieces of their program which Mr. Miller plans to build upon to establish our own program. We plan to have a joint Shawnee meeting soon. **Events**

Absentee Shawnee Tribe – Severe Weather Policy effective December 2013 states:

2. PROVISIONS

a. Prior to normal starting time it will be announced on one of the local television or radio channels that the Absentee Shawnee Tribe is open and/or closed based on weather severity. The Governor, and/or designee, will report to these channels: Channel 4, 5, 9, Fox 25; Radio- KTOK 1000; KOCK 1520 AM. Formerly the policy has been that when schools in Little Axe and Shawnee are closed then employees would be allowed administrative leave. This policy seeks to clarify on procedures and gives the decision making process back to the Tribe.

b. On days when weather conditions worsen as the day progresses, the Governor or another Member of the Executive Committee may decide to close early. In such cases, a decision and an announcement will be made through email to all employees.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus Infection (RSV): RSV in Infants and Young Children

RSV can be dangerous for some infants and young children. Each year in the United States, an estimated 58,000-80,000 children younger than 5 years old are hospitalized due to RSV infection. Those at greatest risk for severe illness from RSV include:

- Premature infants
- Infants, especially those 6 months and younger
- Children younger than 2 years old with chronic lung disease or congenital (present from birth) heart disease
- Children with weakened immune systems
- Children who have neuromuscular disorders, including those who have difficulty swallowing or clearing mucus secretions

Severe RSV Infection

Virtually all children get an RSV infection by the time they are 2 years old. Most of the time RSV will cause a mild, cold-like illness, but it can also cause severe illness such as:

- Bronchiolitis (inflammation of the small airways in the lung)
- Pneumonia (infection of the lungs)

One to two out of every 100 children younger than 6 months of age with RSV infection may need to be hospitalized. Those who are hospitalized may require oxygen, IV fluids (if they aren't eating and drinking), and/or mechanical ventilation (a machine to help with breathing). Most improve with this type of supportive care and are discharged in a few days.

Early Symptoms of RSV

RSV may not be severe when it first starts. However, it can become more severe a few days into the illness. Early symptoms of RSV may include:

- Runny nose
- Decrease in appetite
- Cough, which may progress to wheezing or difficulty breathing

RSV in Very Young Infants

Infants who get an RSV infection almost always show symptoms. This is different from adults who can sometimes get RSV infections and not have symptoms. In very young infants (less than 6 months old), the only symptoms of RSV infection may be:

- Irritability
- Decreased activity
- Decreased appetite
- Apnea (pauses in breathing more than 10 seconds)

Fever may not always occur with RSV infections. These symptoms usually appear in stages and not all at once. In very young infants with RSV, the only symptoms may be irritability, decreased activity, and breathing difficulties.

Almost all children will have had an RSV infection by their second birthday.

What you should do if your child is at high risk for severe RSV infection

RSV season in most regions of the U.S. starts in the fall and peaks in the winter. If you have contact with an infant or young child, especially those who were born prematurely, have chronic lung or heart disease or a weakened immune system, you should take extra care to keep the infant healthy by doing the following:

Wash your hands often

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and help young children do the same. If soap and water are not available, use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer. Washing your hands will help protect you from germs.

Keep your hands off your face

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands. Germs spread this way.

- Avoid close contact with sick people Avoid close contact, such as kissing, and sharing cups or eating utensils with people who have cold-like symptoms.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your upper shirt sleeve when coughing or sneezing. Throw the tissue in the trash afterward.

Clean and disinfect surfaces

Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that people frequently touch, such as toys, doorknobs, and mobile devices. When people infected with RSV touch

surfaces and objects, they can leave behind germs. Also, when they cough or sneeze, droplets containing germs can land on surfaces and objects.

Stay home when you are sick ٠

> If possible, stay home from work, school, and public areas when you are sick. This will help protect others from catching your illness.

Do not kiss infants and babies ٠

> We often get the urge to kiss that infant baby, especially when they are so cute and precious, but we must remember that just one kiss could be dangerous to that baby. Resist that urge to kiss the baby. We have to be careful and not pass on our germs to the infants.

Care

Most RSV infections go away on their own in a week or two.

There is no specific treatment for RSV infection, though researchers are working to develop vaccines and antivirals (medicines that fight viruses).

Take steps to relieve symptoms

- Manage fever and pain with over-the-counter fever reducers and pain relievers, such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen. (Never give aspirin to children.)
- Drink enough fluids. It is important for people with RSV infection to drink enough fluids to prevent dehydration (loss of body fluids).
- Talk to your healthcare provider before giving your child nonprescription cold medicines. Some medicines contain ingredients that are not good for children.

Call your healthcare provider if you or your child is having difficulty breathing, not drinking enough fluids, or experiencing worsening symptoms.

RSV can cause more serious health problems

RSV can also cause more severe infections such as bronchiolitis, an inflammation of the small airways in the lung, and pneumonia, an infection of the lungs. It is the most common cause of bronchiolitis and pneumonia in children younger than 1 year of age.

Healthy adults and infants infected with RSV do not usually need to be hospitalized. But some people with RSV infection, especially older adults and infants younger than 6 months of age, may need to be hospitalized if they are having trouble breathing or are dehydrated. In the most severe cases, a person may require additional oxygen, or IV fluids (if they can't eat or drink enough), or intubation (have a breathing tube inserted through the mouth and down to the airway) with mechanical ventilation (a machine to help a person breathe). In most of these cases, hospitalization only lasts a few days.


Scientists are working to develop vaccines

There is no vaccine yet to prevent RSV infection, but scientists are working hard to develop one. And there is a medicine that can help protect some babies at high risk for severe RSV disease. Healthcare providers usually give this medicine (called palivizumab) to very premature infants and young children with certain heart and lung conditions as a series of monthly shots during RSV season. If you are concerned about your child's risk for severe RSV infection, talk to your child's healthcare provider.



Help yourself, help your tribe and see if you will qualify for coverage that will provide you and your family with immediate access to specialized healthcare at no cost to you or your tribe.

Did you know? The American Rescue Plan (ARP), recently signed into law by President Biden, increases and expands eligibility for cost-savings programs under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) in the form of premium cost assistance for individuals enrolled in Health Insurance Marketplace plans.

The premium assistance is in the form of a IRS Advance Premium Tax Credit taken in advance of the tax year, lowering or eliminating health insurance premiums for lower-and middleincome families. Signing up for a low-or-zero cost health plan allows tribes to receive reimbursement for services, which frees up more dollars to help those who are not eligible for costsavings programs, helping Purchased Referred Care dollars go further

Under 65? Apply for SoonerCare Medicaid Expansion

You could be eligible for SoonerCare Medicaid Expansion benefits, which includes full-scope medical and limited comprehensive dental coverage, for adults ages 19-64 if your income falls at or below 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)-under \$18,768 per year for an individual; under \$38,304 per year for a household of 4 (Children eligible at a higher income threshold under 210%FPL). Per Purchased Referred Care guidelines, all patients under 65 years old, whether insured or uninsured, must apply for SoonerCare to help augment the cost of tribal healthcare services. Help yourself, help your tribe and see if you and your family will qualify for state health insurance benefits at no cost to you or your tribe.

Program rules and continuity of care necessitates completion of an annual application for benefits to assure services are covered, even if ASTHS patient is already insured.
