## Tribe Attends Ohio Heritage Celebration

The Absentee Shawnee Tribe recently returned home from Ohio. The group attended the Great Council Heritage Celebration. The event was held at Great Council State Park in Xenia, OH on June 6. Ohio Department of Natural Resources hosted the gathering as part of the yearlong America 250 celebration events.

Ohio DNR's Division Park Manager Melissa Clark kicked off the festivities. "This celebration is more than a gathering—it's a chance to honor the deep and enduring stories that shaped this land and continue to shape our understanding of America's past."

She went on to say, "Great Council is a place unlike any other. Shawnee leaders met in council here—sharing wisdom, making decisions, and guiding their people. This site preserves the powerful legacy of those who lived, led, and dreamed along these river valleys long before Ohio became a state."

AST Historic Preservation Director Carol Butler made the trip as did several of her staff. They had a booth set up with historical information about the tribe. Also on display were several prints of tribal member Ernest Spybuck's paintings.

"We had a constant stream of people coming up and inquiring about the paintings. They were all so fascinated and intrigued, said Historical Preservation Director Carol Butler. "It was a great opportunity to educate them on what Shawnee life looked like in the past."

Butler also spoke to the crowd about the Absentee Shawnee's culture and how it's thriving today. She reiterated that the Shawnee are not gone. They are still here today and the traditions that they started on this land long before Ohio became a state, are still carried on today back in Oklahoma.

The festival offered guests a unique opportunity to experience the lifestyles and legacies associated with the site, gain a deeper understanding of the Shawnee heritage and enjoy a full day of outdoor learning, food and fun.

More than 300 people were in attendance along with Ohio Governor Mike DeWine; First Lady Fran DeWine and members of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe. "As we celebrate America's 250th birthday, it's important that we honor and preserve Ohio's rich cultural heritage," said Ohio Governor Mike DeWine.

Ohio has 76 state parks and Great Council is the only one that tells the story of the original inhabitants. Several members of the tribe were also in attendance two years ago in 2024 for the grand opening of Great Council State Park.

The three-story structure has over 12,000 square-feet and is designed to pay tribute to the Shawnee longhouse. A living stream is showcased on the main floor along with a theater. The second floor features a historical timeline of the Shawnees in Ohio prior to European settlement and now in modern day. The lower level contains temporary exhibits about culture, history, art and the modern-day Shawnee tribes.

The building also includes a second-story balcony overlooking a view from where the Shawnee village would have been located at the end of the 1700s, including the presumed location of the original council house on site. The park is located on State Route 68 between Xenia and Yellow Springs in Oldtown.

Future park plans include an observation tower and a pedestrian bridge over U.S. 68 connecting the Little Miami Scenic Trail directly to Great Council State Park.

Hello All,

I hope this month finds everyone in good health and thoughts. I have been doing my health screenings mammogram, bone density and heart/cholesterol. My doctor recommended all these extra screenings once I turned 62 in April. I guess these are health issues that can occur when you get into your 60's or maybe because May was Women's Health Month. All you young ladies and men who are around my age remember wellness checks and preventative care are very important.

Schools are out for Summer Break so it's time to stock up on groceries and be ready to pay higher electricity bills. Be sure to have safety plans and sitters in place and make sure to check in with your child because they probably won't check in with you.

This conference was to gather and share information, provide members to deliberate issues of concern, develop strategies to attain goals and serve the needs of Indian and Native American tribal governments, consortia, and organizations. This year's theme, "Exceeding the vision, expanding the possibilities". This conference gave me insight on how the 477 programs can and are assisting not only our AST members but other tribal members within the jurisdiction. Also, Mitch Factor motivated the attendees of the conference with fun, laughter and interaction during the beginning of each day, reception and the banquet.

Our Summer Youth Workers begin on Monday, June 08, 2026 we have one youth worker who will be working within the Lt.

Governor's departments. We are looking forward to sharing and teaching her the daily tasks and experience of working within the AST.

The Agriculture Department had their 5th Annual Fishin' For Nutrition on June 12, 2026 at the AST Farm located at I-40 & 9A from 10am till 2pm. It rained during the morning but there was still a great turn out. I don't think anyone was bothered by the rain, there was actually a couple of participants who waded into the pond to cast their lines. It was good seeing all the families of all ages out having a good time, it was extra special seeing and hearing the excitement once the little ones got a catch. Hopefully this event will only get bigger and better.

The storm shelter request has dwindled down for the elderly. I have decided to lower the age limit to the 45 year old AST homeowners. The application is online or you may pick up a hard copy in the Governor's building #2 located at the AST complex.

# AST Language Achievement & Recruitment Outreach Event

The AST Language & Culture Department recently held their Language Achievement & Recruitment Outreach Event on June 15. Students, instructors and staff came together for games, activities, dinner and recognition. Shawnee language classes were held for 14 weeks in-person and virtual.

Tribal member instructor Daniel City reflected on the class. "It's been incredible to be here for the beginning of our language program, and to see the potential we have as a community to maintain our language as a spoken language. The longer it goes on, the more people will join and learn to speak more and more. I'm excited to watch it snowball!"

The second instructor was tribal member Deric Spoon. "Our language is more than just a way of communication; it is also a connection with the world around us. A connection with kekekelamanike (our ancestors) geni (and) hisaskefi kekeni (mother earth). I look forward to our next class starting as well as to seeing how far everyone will continue to go in their journey to learn." # 5th Annual Absentee Shawnee Day of Champions Camp

The 5th annual Absentee Shawnee Day of Champions football and fast pitch camp had 86 campers strong! The campers worked hard from 8:00 am to 3:00 pm for two days on the Little Axe football field. The campers got to work with 22 different coaches with different skill sets. The fast pitch Division of camp had 3 head fast pitch coaches that the athletes got to learn from. The football athletes learned from 17 coaches from College and Universities.

Coach Ken Heupel, father of National Championship winner Josh Heupel, led the camp and taught the Day of Champions 4 main principles: Discipline, Respect, Trust, Hard Work. The four principles are key to have at home, at school and interest area. Teaching life lessons to the athletes is key to helping them be successful in their future. The Public Health Department and the Tribal Opioid Response department spoke to the campers about making healthy choices. It was exciting to see so many different departments come together to make an event successful and run smoothly.

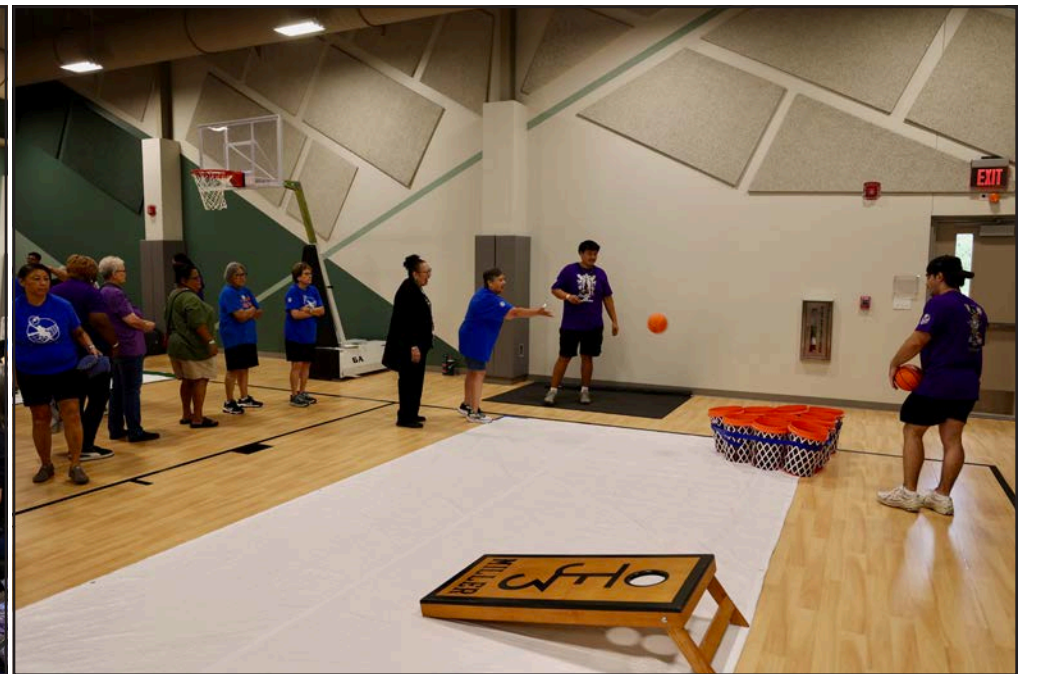

# Rising Warrior Dept. holds Elder Abuse Awareness Event

The Absentee Shawnee Rising Warrior Department held their third annual Elder Abuse Awareness Event June 19. Over 300 people attended the function. The day featured an Elder Olympics theme including bingo, mini golf, cornhole, basketball toss and bean bag games. The biggest attraction was the chair volleyball tournament with over 20 teams competing. The top three teams took home medals. First place was Glenpool, second place - Tenetke and third place- Afsvske. The elders were also treated to lunch and prizes throughout the day. Outside the venue, several departments and other agencies promoted the services offered for elders.

Former Assistant Chief of the Seminole Nation Brian Palmer was the guest speaker. He spoke on the importance of being aware of elder abuse and the reality that it happens not just in Indian country but all over. "It's so great to see the AST Elder Protection program take the initiative and respond on behalf of the unseen and sometimes unheard individuals in our community," Palmer said. "It's not a great conversation to have but it's one that's needed."

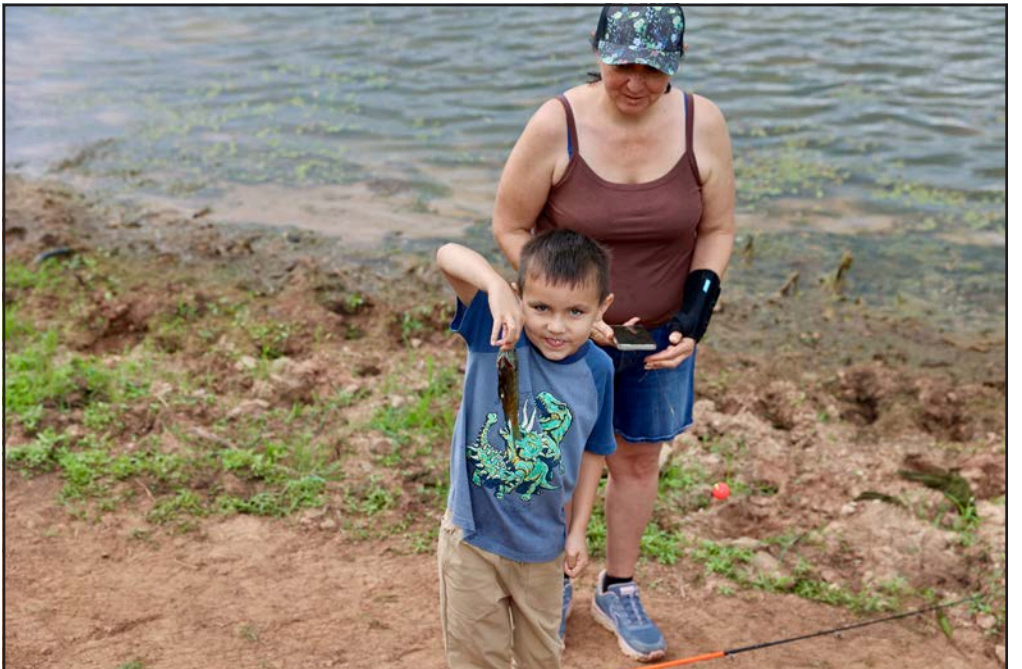

The Absentee Shawnee Tribe Election Commission held a Community Meeting on Sunday, May 17, 2026, at 2:00 pm at the AST Health Multi-Purpose Building in Shawnee, Oklahoma. Although no members of the General Council were present, aside from the six (6) members of the Election Commission, the meeting proceeded as planned. Each member present received the following:

- Election Commission Voting Brochure
- Staggered Elections Proposal
- Sections of the Constitution:
  - Article IV-Tribal Government
  - Article VI-Elections
  - Section 2: Legislative/Executive Branch
  - Section 2
  - (b) Term of Office.
  - Section 7: Kinds of Elections.
  - (a) Annual Election

Commissioner Spybuck opened the meeting with a discussion of the Election Commission's Mission Statement:

a. Mission Statement

*The Election Commission's mission is to ensure that the democratic process is protected, secure, and strong. We strive to ensure that the voices of the Absentee Shawnee members are not only heard but also valued by their elected representatives.*

Commissioner Spybuck reiterated the purpose of this meeting and stated that the Mission Statement is to ensure the voices of the Absentee Shawnee are heard by addressing questions from tribal members regarding Electronic Voting: pricing, the confidentiality data of tribal members, absentee ballots, and spoiled ballots. The Constitution and the Ordinance were among the other topics addressed. In the current election process, there are many checks and balances, such as having watchers, a judge, and police officers present during voting. Additional topics considered included factors contributing to voter abstention, for example, being out of jurisdiction or feeling that one's vote or voice does not count.

b. Vacancies

Commissioner Spybuck addressed the pros and cons when vacancies occur within the Executive Committee and how the positions are filled: either by members shifting up or by prorating the remainder of the term and having tribal members vote in a new person for the vacant positions (giving the Absentee Shawnee Tribal members their voices back concerning vacant positions).

c. AST Constitution

Commissioner Spybuck discussed Article IV-Tribal Government, Section 2. Legislative/Executive Branch, part (b) Term of Office. Both the AST Constitution and the Mission Statement are intended to ensure that tribal members' voices are heard.

d. Term Staggering

Commissioner Spybuck explained the benefits of a staggered election. According to the Staggered Elections Proposal handout, "this adjustment will allow for true continuity and support while their colleague learns their duties and obligations."

e. Podcast

AST Media recently conducted a podcast with Commissioner Spybuck, which will be released in June 2026.

Our annual plant distribution also had a great turnout, with almost 100 Tribal members benefiting from the program.

On the livestock side, our cattle program continues to grow. We currently have 50 calves on the ground, and staff is working hard to maintain herd health and prepare for the future of the program.

We are excited to have Summer Youth participants joining us at the Agriculture Department! They have jumped right in and have already been such a big help around the farm. They are getting hands-on experience with everyday agriculture, from helping with projects to learning what goes into caring for livestock and maintaining the land. We enjoy getting to share what we do with the next generation and are thankful to have them as part of our team this summer!

Hay season is officially underway! The Agriculture team has started cutting and baling hay to help provide quality feed for the livestock through the upcoming seasons.

Before joining ASTHS, he held healthcare leadership roles in Oklahoma City and has remained dedicated to expanding healthcare access and research opportunities for Native communities.

Joining Dr. Lofgren in leadership at ASTHS is Deana Aissaoui, whose path to healthcare began through her service in the United States Marine Corps. After completing two tours in Iraq assisting with medical evacuations, Aissaoui discovered a passion for patient care that would shape the course of her career. Inspired by those experiences, she set a goal to become a Registered Nurse and steadily worked her way through every level of the healthcare field to achieve it.

Aissaoui's healthcare journey began in frontline patient care roles, serving as a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), Certified Medical Assistant (CMA), Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN), and eventually a Registered Nurse (RN). 
