AST Cultural Preservation Hosts Ohio History Connection





The AST Cultural Preservation Department recently met with representatives from the Ohio History Connection. Bill Mahon, Director of Interpretation and Experience for the Ohio History Connection, and Kim Koloski, Senior Graphic Designer brought draft panel layouts for the Interpretative Center and the traveling photography exhibit.

The Cultural Preservation staff along with AST Representative DeWayne Wilson reviewed and gave comments on the content and displays to be in the Great Council State Park. Also joining the meeting via zoom were representatives from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and Ball State University.

The Cultural Preservation / Historic Preservation Staff reflected on the meeting "We were incredibly excited to host Bill and Kim today. In OHC's wish to travel here to Oklahoma, the priority of genuine collaboration on the Great Council State Park remains absolutely commendable. Our virtual guests from Ball State University and ONDR too are wonderful for taking time to sit with us throughout the meeting. We've always felt that our Tribe's voice in this project has and continues to be heard, and that is a precious feeling in our persistent aim to represent our Tribe well".

The AST language program has been providing words and phrases that will be used on displays and panels throughout

the center. Ohio Department of Natural Resources broke ground on the facility in May of 2022 and construction is expected to be complete in spring of 2024.

ODNR has been working with the Ohio History Connection and the three Shawnee tribes: the Absentee Shawnee Tribe; Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma and the Shawnee Tribe to develop plans for the interpretive center. All displays will honor the Shawnee tribes of the past and allow present-day members to share their stories and legacy.

The three-story structure will have over 12,000 square-feet and is designed to pay tribute to the Shawnee longhouse. A living stream will be showcased on the main floor along with a theater. The

first floor will also feature two interactive exhibits for kids - cattail weaving and ribbonwork. The second floor will feature a historical timeline of the Shawnees in Ohio prior to European settlement and now in modern day. The lower level will feature temporary exhibits about culture, history, art and the modern-day Shawnee tribes. The building also includes a second story balcony overlooking a view from where the Shawnee village would have been located at the end of the 1700s, including the presumed location of the original council house on site.

The facility should be open in 2024.

From The Election Commission

Tribal Members:

The Primary Election will be held on Saturday, March 16, 2024. The voting polls will be located at the Little Axe Resource Center on Peebly Road, 1970 156th Ave NE, in Norman, Oklahoma and at the AST Health Multipurpose Building, 2029 James L Edwards Lane, on the Tribal Complex in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at both locations.

APPROPRIATE POLL BEHAVIOR

According to the Election Ordinance Article VIII Section 1 - The official polling sites and adjoining Tribal Grounds are neutral grounds, therefore, there shall be no campaigning or loitering on Election Day by any person. It shall be the duty of the Election Commission to request that Tribal police, be present at each polling place and be responsible for maintaining order, prevent campaigning, and loitering during the election process.

In order to comply we suggest that you do not campaign in any fashion. For Example:

No disbursement of campaign material

No campaign clothing

No counseling as to who to vote for

Do not loiter at poll site: 1. Arrive

No "vote for. . ."sticker on cars

- 2. Register
- 3. Vote
- 4. Exit

Unless there is a line each voter should be at the poll, no more than 10 minutes, outside of voter booth. Each voter may take all the time they need to read the ballot to vote in the private booth but should not "visit" with Commissioners or other voters at the poll site.

Any visiting of voters must occur outside of the Poll Site and adjoining Tribal grounds.

Voting Polls close at 6:00 p.m. Voter has to be in line in order to vote.

Policies and Procedures states:

There shall be no campaigning on property of polling site. This includes signs, person to person, clothing, etc. or within 200 ft. of the polling site. On Election Day all signs must be over 200 ft. away from the edge of tribal property that contain poll sites.

I attended a two day workshop sponsored by Thunderbird Sailing Club at Lake Thunderbird. I met with the design team, Larson Design Group. They had so many new plans and ideals for revamping and rebranding the lake. All these ideals were discussed amongst the 25 to 30 people in attendance. Just to name a few they talked about Floating Cabins, Canoeing on the north part of the lake, adding restaurants, adding more campsites with electricity and enlarging the walking and bike trails for campers. They also suggested an area for floating slides and large water inflatables for more families to enjoy. I'm very glad I attended this workshop it was very informative for the community. I want to personally congratulate the two individuals (right) who have successfully completed Pro Driving School. They have done an excellent job and successfully completed all required courses to obtain their CDL. I want to tell them both Congratulations and job well done.

Maintenance:

The Facilities Maintenance Department continues to dedicate themselves to the highest standard while demonstrating initiative, professionalism and innovation to support Tribal Departments. We are in the process of restructuring/ reorganizing of the department, which is currently staffed by five full-time maintenance workers and 2 full-time housekeepers. The guys have been super busy with maintaining all incoming work orders which consist of minor repairs, moving/ rearranging offices and assembling/ installing new furniture. Housekeeping has been working effortlessly with maintaining the upkeep of the buildings on the complex. I would like to thank the Maintenance staff for all the hard work they do for the department and Tribe.

<u>OEH:</u>

In total for 2024 OEH has assisted Tribal members with 12 different septic renovations and installations, water well drilling and installations, well renovations, and community water connections.

For 2024, we have collected, processed, and recycled 4 bales of shredded office paper and cardboard equaling roughly 3 tons of recyclable waste that has been diverted from landfills.

The Police Safety Center has been completed and is currently in the process of becoming operational.

Hello fellow Tribal Members, Family, and Friends:

The last few months have been difficult for many of us. Each is trying to move on, in their own way, after dealing with the loss of loved ones. For me, I take solace in knowing they are no longer suffering and are in a much better place. They have been reunited with our ancestors. It is my hope the Creator helps to fill the void and provides the comfort one requires in their time of need. Prayers and blessings to those affected.

Spring is right around the corner and the changing of the seasons is near. The plants will be blooming and the trees budding. Before long, many will be spending their evenings at the ball field, cheering on their favorite players. I hope for a successful, prosperous season without any major injuries. I do my best to provide support for our young up and coming athletes when families invite me. If you would like me to attend, forward a schedule on to my office.

In other news, as a part of the Tribal Economic Tax Reform Advocacy Alliance

(TETRAA), I was able to attend the Quarterly Treasury Tribal Advisory Council (TTAC) meeting, held during February in Washington, D.C. While there, along with other Tribal leaders, we were able to schedule meetings with U.S. Senate and House members to discuss pressing issues in Indian Country, and educate these individuals about the responsibilities and obligations of the U.S. Government to our Tribes. Additionally, I was able to get comments put on the record about suggestions to the TTAC Council in their advisory role to the U.S. Treasurer, Chief Lynn Malerba.

This past month, I attended a Consultation Meeting in Tulsa with a group of Archaeologists based out of Kentucky and Ohio. I have shared the information with Governor Johnson and provided a suggestion and recommendation for our involvement or approval for the group to proceed with their study. We will wait for the announcement of the results to be published. So far, the researchers are only waiting for the Eastern Shawnee to give their blessing to move forward.

As of today, it was reported to me that our Ag Department is in the middle of Calving Season and so far, we have 11

heifer and 7 bull calves on the ground. There is one loss due to a stillborn birth. The guys have been working with Tribal members to get them scheduled for tilling or plowing of individual gardens. My only request is folks make a determination of how much area they can manage prior to staff coming to do the work. Be on the lookout next month for the Spring Plant Distribution, as well as, the Pig Roast. Once dates are confirmed, we'll send out the flyer.

In conclusion, I want to say "Neyiwa!" to those who continue to provide advice, encouragement, and support. Despite the negativity, I continue to fulfill my responsibilities and provide opinions to keep our Tribe progressing in the right direction. I want to say "Good Luck" to the candidates running for their respective positions and look forward to working with whoever the Members deem worthy to complete these tasks.

management and/ or 477 Program Administration. The 477 Program Case Management Software was installed and is working to upload case information to ease reporting requirements. We will be submitting our first 477 Program Report for our first year of the AST 477 Plan.

CCDF Program: The CCDF Child Care Staff have officially moved into the new After School Program (ASP) building on the complex across the street from Building Blocks II. The ASP Shawnee staff had a soft opening and is planning a Grand opening/ ribbon cutting ceremony event for March, 2024. CCDF Staff have been working hard, setting up offices and classrooms to making sure to give adequate service to providers & ASP children. Some more good news, after some water pressure testing conducted by the City of Shawnee, the new ASP building DOES have adequate water pressure to operate this facility.

Education Department: The Education Director continues to attend weekly meetings of the OK STEP Grant Project with Sac and Fox Nation and TEDNA. The Education Director also conducts/ attends weekly FY24 CTAS Planning meetings. This month, Education Director attended the OKC Metro ESSA Tribal Consultation at Moore Public Schools and a Title VI and Impact Aid Parent Meeting at Little Axe Public Schools. Finally, Education Director conducted an Education Committee Meeting this

month, the first in a while. The Tribal Youth Program Coordinator participated in a Zoom meeting with Dream Navigator creator to begin development of our tribal specific career readiness curricu-

Workforce Program: The H/VAC mechanic and the H/VAC interns have been busy completing work orders on the Tribal Complex and to Tribal member homes. In the near future, the H/VAC Department will be transitioning from heating to air- conditioning service. Let us know if we can be of service.

Cultural Preservation: The Cultural Preservation and THPO departments, along with the Language Program will be partnering with the CCDF/After School Program for an exciting project! This project/ partnership will meet once or twice a month, sharing the language, culture, and history of the Shawnee people with the participants of the CCDF/ After School program. These topics will be taught through games, crafts, and presentations in lessons titled, "We Are Shawnee". ! As mentioned in the previous newsletter, the Gift Shop and the Library will be rebranding in the coming months. As both programs are a part of Cultural Preservation, they plan to have books and items that are more culturally inclusive and reflect the department's mission and goals.

Please note, they will be asking for your opinions in the coming months with a survey. In the latter part of February, the Cultural Preservation Dept., the Tribal Historic Preservation Office and Language Program will have an in person meeting with Mr. Bill Mahon, Director of Interpretation and Experience and Ms. Kim Koloski, Senior Graphic Designer, both with the Ohio History Connection. At this meeting, draft panel layouts for the Great Council State Park Interpretative Center will be reviewed and comments given by the staff of Cultural Preservation Depts. Also, we will review the traveling photography exhibit the Ohio History Connection developed in partnership with Ohio Department of Natural Resources. Our excitement grows as the opening date of the Great Council State Park in the State of Ohio nears!

Gaming Commission: This month is the official start of our Internal Audit being conducted in-house which the Gaming Commission is very excited to

get started. As it was mentioned in last month's newsletter, the Gaming Commission was getting ready for the renewal process of Thunderbird Casino Norman location facility license. It has been completed. The license is scheduled to be signed by the Gaming Commissioners at our next Gaming Commission meeting. On a similar note, we are still currently looking for a third Gaming Commissioner. If you are interested in being a Gaming Commissioner please send a Letter of Interest (LOI) to Secretary McGirt's Office.

Youth Camp: Not much to report on construction, we are currently in the 30 day process of having to re- advertise (Public Notice) for bids pertaining to Camp Nikoti lighting. Cleveland County is doing some road work.



Tribal Member Strikes Gold at Winter Games; Heading to State Games





Tribal member Gregory James recently received a gold medal in bowling at the area Winter Games. He is a member of the Norman Marvels Special Olympics team. He bowled a 124 securing his right to compete in the State Games in Stillwater coming up in May.

He typically practices about once a week and has only been back in the sport since September 2023. He normally bowls around 80 so this high score was even a shock to his mom Billie James .

She was so caught up in the moment that she didn't even take any pictures. "I was on the edge of my seat. I was so surprised. I just couldn't believe it." She said. John Seals, Vice President of Sports and Training for the Special Olympics said that bowling is the only sport that you have to win the Winter Games in order to compete at the State games. Any of the other sporting events you only have to compete to go to state.

But James isn't in this just for the hardware. He really likes the camaraderie. His mom said if he doesn't make strikes he doesn't get mad. James said the best part of bowling is being with his friends.

And once you meet him, you have made a true friend. His big personality and positive demeanor shines through.

His coach Eva Smith couldn't agree more. "Gregory has been a joy to have on the Norman Marvels team. He has the spirit of a true Olympian with his determination to better his scores every week as well as by the kindness he shows to all of his teammates. He always shows up with an amazing positive attitude and enthusiasm to cheer on the team."

This year 382 Special Olympians qualified for the bowling State Games and at least 250-300 will go on to compete. The State Games are expecting close to 5,000 athletes this year.

No matter the outcome, Gregory James will always be a winner and true champion.


Subject: AllNations Bank Joins National Bankers Association

The NBA is the national trade association for Minority-owned Depository Institutions (MDIs). The NBA advocates for MDIs with regulatory agencies and Congress on matters of particular interest to minority institutions. NBA also provides various services to MDIs including providing access to products and services that assist the banks in meeting the banking needs of their customers including minorities, low-income individuals and small businesses.

An immediate benefit from joining the NBA happened shortly after the bank joined the association. AllNations Bank was selected to be one of 15 banks designated to participate in a program to assist the bank in assessing and implementing improvements in the bank's use of technology. This program is funded by a \$10 million grant from the Citi Fund, a foundation supported by Citibank.

CULTURAL PRESERVATION DEPARTMENT

The first two months of the year have been full of planning and exciting transformation for Cultural Preservation. Following is a breakdown of each departmental program's most recent activities.

Cultural Preservation

We are excited to be partnering with CCDF/After School Program for a collaboration labeled "We Are Shawnee"! We have had a first sit down planning meeting with the staff of CCDF in which we were introduced to the goals of this collaboration. Once or twice a week or as time permits, Cultural Preservation staff will be sharing the language, culture, and history of the Shawnee people with the children enrolled in the program. We plan to do this through hands on activities such as games, crafts, and presentations. The overarching goal of this collaboration is to give the children participants a sense of identity and introduce them to the Shawnee culture.

Gift Shop

The Gift Shop is currently open, and we are having an inventory clearance sale! Almost everything in the Gift Shop is on sale. However, please be aware, soon we will be closing our doors for a period of time to prepare for a transformation. The gift shop is a program of Cultural Preservation, and as so, the staff of Cultural Preservation will be rebranding the shop. We will be no longer be carrying some of the items that we currently have in stock, and instead, we will be purchasing items that are more culturally inclusive and reflects the department's mission and goals of preserving the history of the Shawnee culture. When you enter the gift shop, we want you to see items you wouldn't see anywhere else. We want our shoppers to be able to purchase items that are Shawnee and Shawnee made. Some of the items we as a department have already discussed to carry are books about Shawnees, more supplies, tribal member's handmade items, and of course more emblem barring items. Also, we will be distributing a survey so that we can hear your opinions of what you would like to see us carry. Please look for that soon.

The gift shop is located in building 6 just east of the new police station. Our current hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. If you have any questions or concerns, please reach out to us at Cultural.Preservation@astribe.com.

The Library is open! Hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Last month, activity in the library included 3 library visitors with a total of 10 books checked out. Like with the Gift Shop, we will be rebranding the library. We want to carry more Native American and more specifically Shawnee books and resources. Please let us know your opinions of what you would like to see in the library.

THPO (Tribal Historic Preservation Office)

Our Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) Program continues to make great strides and advancements. The THPO staff has steadily been receiving Section 106 projects from various Federal and State Agencies. Over the past month; the THPO Officer, Mrs. Devon Frazier-Smith, and TCNS Coordinator/THPO Specialist, Mr. Clayton Martinez, have together received 575 new Section 106 projects for review and consultation. The program staff has successfully consulted on 420 of these received projects, of which occur in 12 of our 25 areas of interest/states. The THPO Staff, including myself as Director, have also taken part in 10 teleconference calls regarding Section 106 projects or NAGPRA cases.

NAGPRA

In addition to Cultural Preservation Director, I currently hold the position of interim NAGPRA Coordinator. The last few months have been very busy for me. More and more agencies/museums/colleges both in the states and overseas have been reaching out. Currently, we are in consultation with 12 different facilities concerning the ancestors and funerary objects they have in their possession.

Great Council State Park

We continue to collaborate with the Ohio History Connection and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources on content for the Great Council State Park Interpretive Center located in Ohio. As mentioned last month, the language program has been providing words and phrases that will be used on displays and panels throughout the Center. In addition, our Tribal Historic Preservation Office has been working with Ohio, for an extended time, on the content of the panels, and on February 22nd, Mr. Bill Mahon, Director of Interpretation and Experience for the Ohio History Connection, and Ms. Kim Koloski, Senior Graphic Designer also with the Ohio History Connection, came to the complex for an in person meeting. At this meeting, draft panel layouts for the Interpretative Center and the traveling photography exhibit were reviewed and comments given by the staff of Cultural Preservation. At the time of writing this article, no grand opening date has been set.

Language

We are estimating to begin open language classes by mid-April. It is likely we will provide online classes along with in-person classes as we understand we have tribal members who live at great distances or may not have the means to make an in-person class.

Moving forward, all material, whether it is lessons or coloring books or flash cards, will have a QR code to scan. This allows young and old to hear how the words or phrases are said, especially if there is no one close that can speak Shawnee.

Further, we are collaborating with the Afterschool Program and SPR-PFS Grant to provide language material to local students who are part of their programs. Through this collaboration we will reach more tribal children to provide them with the opportunity to learn Shawnee and teach them about the Shawnee culture. 
February was a busy month at Building Blocks. March will also be busy and exciting for the children with lots of activities and learning as the children play.

I contacted health two years ago, for an updated copy of our health guidelines, I have not received. Tribal Members need a copy.

We need to work on realty trust lands, reduce number of heirs. Sell to heirs and paid by remaining heirs at appraised price?

National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

National Colorectal cancer is the second deadliest cancer in the United States. Yet it's one of the few cancers that is preventable thanks to screening. Here are two reasons why getting checked matters:

- Screening can find the warning signs of colon and rectal cancer, letting doctors take action to prevent the disease.
- Screening can also find colorectal cancer early, when treatment is most effective

Native American People are More Likely to get Certain Cancers Compared to Non-Hispanic White People

American Indian and Alaska Native (Native American) people have much higher rates of getting several cancers, including lung, colorectal, liver, stomach, and kidney cancers, compared to non-Hispanic White people in the United States. There are also important differences in the rate of getting cancer between the six regions where most Native American people live.

Scientists used United States Cancer Statistics data to see how many Native Americans got cancer from 2012 to 2016. They compared rates of getting cancer in six regions: the Northern Plains, Pacific Coast, East, and Southwest.

- American Indian and Alaska Native people were more likely to get liver, stomach, kidney, lung, colorectal, and female breast cancers than White people in most regions.
- Compared to White men, Native American men had higher rates of getting liver, stomach, kidney, colorectal, and lung cancer and myeloma.
- Compared to White women, Native American women had higher rates of getting liver, stomach, kidney, colorectal, and cervical cancer.
- Native American men were more likely to get cancer than Native American women. The difference ranged from 23% more likely for lung cancer to 129% more likely for liver cancer.
- The biggest differences in cancer rates between Native American men and White men were found in Alaska, followed by the Southern Plains, Southwest, and Northern Plains.
- The biggest differences in cancer rates between Native American women and White women were found in the Southern Plains, followed by the Northern Plains, Alaska, and Pacific Coast.

Build Awareness of Colorectal Cancer

1. Early Detection and Screening is Key

Cancer is deadly, but the good news is thousands of cancer cases, and deaths can be prevented through early detection and screening.

2. Cancer is a Leading Cause of Death

In 2019, cancer was said to be the world's second leading cause of death, with breast (2.26 million cases) and lung (2.21 million cases) being the most common types of cancer, according to the WHO.

3. Cancer Research has Decreased Death Rates

More effective cancer treatment has decreased the death rate according to the American Cancer Society and, more specifically, lung cancer.

4. Smoking Increases Your Risk of Lung Cancer

The most effective preventative measure against the disease is to stop smoking. The more cigarettes you smoke, the higher your risk.

5. February 4 Marks "World Cancer Day"

Founded in 2000 and led by the Union for International Cancer Control (U.I.C.C.), the day aims to increase global awareness about cancer and save many from suffering and death.

Why National Cancer Prevention Month Is Important

One in 24 people will be diagnosed with colorectal cancer in their lifetime, but you can make a difference today. Colorectal cancer (CRC) is a leading cancer worldwide; incidence varies greatly by country and racial group. We compared 2018 American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) CRC incidence rates in Alaska to other Tribal, racial, and international population rates. AI/AN persons in Alaska had the highest CRC incidence rate among US Tribal and racial groups. AI/AN persons in Alaska also had higher rates than those reported for any other country in the world in 2018 except for Hungary, where males had a higher CRC incidence rate than AI/AN males in Alaska. This review of CRC incidence rates from populations in the United States and worldwide showed that AI/AN persons in Alaska had the highest documented incidence rate of CRC in the world in 2018. It is important to inform health systems serving AI/AN persons in Alaska about policies and interventions that can support CRC screening to reduce the burden of this disease. This does not mean that CRC cannot affect other AI/AN in other parts of the US, including here in Oklahoma.

US Trends

Colorectal cancer (CRC) is the third most frequently diagnosed cancer and the second leading cause of cancer deaths in the general US population. Cancer screening programs are partly responsible for declining CRC incidence and mortality in the United States. Unfortunately, American Indians (AIs) have experienced either no change or an increase in CRC incidence and mortality, disproportionate diagnosis of late-stage disease, and poorer survival.

Low Screening Rates

Despite the effectiveness of CRC screening tests for average-risk adults, these tests are significantly under-utilized by AIs, especially compared to urban Hispanic Whites, adjusting for socio-economic status and other factors. Nearly two-thirds (65%) of US adults are current with CRC screening per US Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) guidelines. However, based on the Indian Health Service (IHS) Government Performance and Results Act data, screening rates ranged from a low of 28.1% in the Phoenix Area to a high of 50.5% in the Oklahoma Area, and 35% in Tucson and 41.9% in the Albuquerque Area. Most tribes possess remarkably few healthcare resources to address CRC screening disparities and face many issues that underscore the need to implement effective CRC screening interventions targeting AIs, while engaging them with culturally appropriate interventions.

How Can Cancer Rates Be Lowered Among Native American People?

- American Indian and Alaska Native people have some of the highest rates of getting certain cancers in the United States. To help lower the number of future cancers, experts suggest:

 Making sure American Indian and Alaska Native people get cancer screening tests. Screening tests can prevent some common cancers or find them early, when they are easier to
- Making sure preventive health care services and programs are available to help people quit smoking.
- Developing programs that promote healthy eating and keeping a healthy weight.

What Can You Do?

- Make an appointment for your yearly examination with your provider to be checked for colorectal cancer, especially if there is a family history.
- Watch your diet for foods that may contribute to an unhealthy lifestyle.
- Stop smoking and using tobaccos that are not healthy for you.
- Begin an exercise program that fits into your schedule and stick with it to maintain a healthy weight.



TOR provides prevention, treatment and recovery resources for citizens of federally recognized tribes in Cleveland, Lincoln, Logan, Oklahoma and Pottawatomie counties. The applicant age for TOR resources ranges from adolescent to adult. As part of our prevention outreach, TOR is hosting a Ribbon Skirt Class in Little Axe in late February. This class was full within an hour. Only 10 people per class are allowed. We'll be offering other classes in the months ahead so keep your eyes and ears open.

Hello, spring! Spring is all about new things, and AST Health System has something new in the works.

The population of older Native Americans is growing quickly, leading to an increased risk for Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. By 2060, the number of Native Americans aged 65 and older living with dementia is projected to increase five-fold.

Expanding the capability for dementia care within ASTHS got a boost late last year with the award of a grant "Addressing Dementia in Indian Country: Models of Care".

What is a model of care?

A model of care is a multifaceted approach to how health care services are delivered. It outlines best practice care and services for a person, their caregiver, or population group as they progress through the stages of a condition, injury, or event.

By developing models of care, we can support the expansion of all-inclusive and sustainable dementia care and services in AST Health System that are responsive to the needs of persons living with dementia and their caregivers.

Care for persons living with dementia includes care for their caregiver. Also, families and other caregivers need help in navigating services, help in understanding what to expect, how to respond to the challenges of living with dementia, and support for self-care. Interventions like Savvy Caregiver in Indian Country and Music & Memory will continue to be provided through grant funding so there is no cost to participants.

MEDICARE PART B SPONSORSHIP/REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

Dear Absentee Shawnee Tribal Member,

All Absentee Shawnee Tribal members 65 and older that live in the following counties: Cleveland, Lincoln, Logan, Oklahoma and Pottawatomie, may qualify for the Medicare Part B premium Reimbursement Program.

To qualify for Medicare Part B Tribal Sponsorship Program, you must be an active patient with the ASTHS Primary Care. As your primary care healthcare provider and/or your PRC - Contract Health Services coordinator, ASTHS agrees to reimburse you for your Medicare Part B premiums paid through Social Security Administration's Medicare Benefit program.

SoonerSelect Know Your Native Options



Oklahoma's State SoonerCare Medicaid program is moving to a new health plan program with managed care network plans called SoonerSelect starting February 2024. Know your options.

> Opt Out: Native Americans will automatically be opted out and remain in the traditional SoonerCare medical and dental programs. Native American SoonerCare members have the choice to opt in to a SoonerSelect network plan, however it would then be necessary to verify the new medical and dental plans work for you and your tribal health program. If you stay opted out, your SoonerCare benefits will remain unchanged and no action is required.



> Opt In: SoonerSelect network plans may offer some extra benefits not offered with traditional SoonerCare to help improve your health, however Native Americans will need to opt in, shop the medical and dental plans, and enroll.

Note: Non-Native SoonerCare family members must select a medical and dental plan before open enrollment closes or the member will be auto-enrolled.

Dental Plan Open Enrollment: December 1, 2023 - January 10, 2024 Medical Plan Open Enrollment: February 1, 2024 - March 10, 2024
